The police are at my door...

- If officers knock on your door, ask through the door if they have a warrant.
- If the officers do not have a warrant, don't let them into your home and say, "<u>I'm not letting you</u> in without a warrant," and, "<u>I don't consent to you</u> searching my home."
- If the officers have a warrant, ask the officers to slip it under the door or show it to you through a window.
- Do not consent to the search. Say, "<u>I don't</u> <u>consent to the search</u>." Do not interfere if the officers still do the search.
- **Call your lawyer**. Ask if you are allowed to watch the search. If allowed, take notes about the search. Do not answer questions or say anything to the police.
- If others are present, have them act as witnesses to observe what is happening.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS ENCOUNTERING POLICE



I've been *stopped* by police...

- DETERMINE IF FREE TO GO. Ask the officer, "<u>Am I free to go?</u>" If yes, calmly walk away. If no, you are detained.
- REMAIN SILENT. The right to remain silent must be spoken to be effective. As soon as you know you have been detained, say, "<u>I want a lawyer. I will</u> remain silent." Afterwards, remain silent.
- IF ASKED, PROVIDE REQUIRED INFORMATION. If an officer asks for your name and address, you must answer. You must give the officer your ID if they ask for it. You do not have to answer any other questions.
- REFUSE SEARCHES. If an officer wants to search you, say and repeat, "<u>I do not consent to</u> <u>searches.</u>" Do not obstruct the police from searching you or your bag.
 - * REDUCE RISK TO YOURSELF. Don't physically resist officers. Don't run or obstruct the officers. Keep your hands visible.

I've been *pulled over* by police...

• PROVIDE REQUIRED DOCUMENTS.

Keep your hands visible and inform the officer you are reaching for your paperwork. Provide your driver's license, registration, and proof of insurance.

- REMAIN SILENT. Both driver and passengers have the right to remain silent and are not obligated to answer further questions. Clearly assert your rights and say, "<u>I will remain silent.</u>"
- REFUSE SEARCHES. If an officer wants to search your car, say, "<u>I don't consent to searches.</u>"

* REDUCE RISK TO YOURSELF. Turn off the car. Turn on the internal light. Partially open the window. Place your hands on the wheel.

If your rights have been violated, file an ACLU-CO intake form, or file a complaint with the police department's internal affairs division or civilian complaint board.

I've been arrested by police...

- REMAIN SILENT & ASK FOR A LAWYER. Don't say anything, sign anything or make any decisions without a lawyer. Say, "I want a lawyer. I will remain silent."
- **DO NOT TALK ABOUT YOUR CASE.** While in jail, assume you are being watched and listened to. Do not speak about your case with jail staff or people incarcerated with you.
- MAKE A PHONE CALL. Jail lines are recorded. Police can and will listen to any call you make on a jail phone. One exception: police are not allowed to listen to calls with your lawyer.
- SEEING A LAWYER. If you can't pay for a lawyer, the court will assign you one for free. You must be taken before a judge to set bond within 48 hours of your arrest. Remember: don't say anything or sign anything without your lawyer.

REDUCE RISK TO YOURSELF. Do not resist arrest, even if you believe the arrest is unfair. Follow the officers' commands.
